Kellee James '98 was [named CEO of Oregon Tilth](#), a nonprofit organization focused on promoting ecologically and socially sustainable agriculture. After graduating from UK with a B.A. in Spanish, Kellee founded and led Mercaris—a major marketing platform for sustainable agricultural commodities—until it was acquired in 2023. “My time in the UK Honors program shaped my values, my network, sense of possibility, and therefore my career trajectory, though I didn’t realize it at the time,” Kellee shared. She remembers her Honors classes, like Dr. Pem Kremer’s class, as places to engage in hard conversations about complex subjects and important ideas, civilly and respectfully: “We had rousing, but respectful conversations on topics like diversity in my Honors classes. Those debates honed useful skills for navigating an increasingly complex and divided world.” Congrats on your new position, Kellee!
